Eszter Kismödi is a Hungarian international human rights lawyer based in Geneva, serving as CEO of Sexual and Reproductive Health Matters. With over two decades of experience in sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR), her work bridges human rights, law, and public health, including a decade as Human Rights Adviser at WHO and various senior advisory roles for UNAIDS, UNFPA, UNHCR, UNDP, and OHCHR. She holds leadership positions in the World Association for Sexual Health, serves on multiple global committees (such as WHO's Transgender Health and Ethics Review committees), and is a visiting fellow at Yale Law School and former visiting scholar at Harvard Law School. She also lectures at several universities and publishes extensively on SRHR and global health governance.
